### **YEAR 10**

Welcome back Year 10 to the final ½ term of the year. Despite only being back in school for 2 weeks, we have already moved into a high gear with the first real GCSE having been completed by some of the cohort who sat the GCSE Stats exam on the first day back – well done to all of you who have now completed your first official GCSE paper!

We have also had Year 10 geographers out of school, completing their data collection for their fieldwork. They visited Swanage to investigate if the beach management is successfully preventing longshore drift, as well as looking into the importance of tourism in the area. The year 10's were a real credit to the school, collecting really excellent data whilst dodging the rain. Well done year 10 geographers!

Finally, our Prefect team finally received their Prefect ties during an event at school this week, and will now wear these around school. The evening was lovely, and included performances from students in other year groups at the school, as well as a speech delivered by our very own Head Boy and Girl. Well done to all involved!

For the final half term of the academic year, we are revisiting the theme of 'Living in the Wider World'. This builds upon the previous units the students completed in this theme that took place in the Spring Term 1 half term.

#### YEAR 7: FINANCIAL DECISION MAKING

In this unit students will be introduced to issues relating to money. They will be encouraged to begin taking responsibility for their money and making informed and sensible choices. They will explore how to choose a bank account, how to understand their bank statement, how to budget and manage their money, reflect on their money personality and have an understanding of how much things cost. They will explore this in greater detail in Year 9 where they will revisit budgeting as well as renting and mortgages. They will also complete a final finance unit in Year 10 which will deal with issues relating to debt, saving and understanding their payslips.

#### YEAR 9: GLOBAL CONCERNS

Year 9 will be exploring 9 major Global Concerns in their Education for Life lessons this half term. They will reflect on our place in the world before investigating critical issues such as the growing demand for water, the rising threat of Single Use Plastics and the issues surrounding the use of Cobalt, an element mined by many children in Low Income Countries, in modern day technologies such as smartphones and Electric Vehicles (EVs). Students will also assess the impact of the Fast Fashion industry to society and the environment, and learn how we can minimise the environmental impact of our holidays. There is a strong thread of the concept of Sustainability throughout this scheme of work.

#### YEAR 8: CITIZENSHIP

In this unit students will explore different types of government with a focus on the difference between a democracy and a dictatorship. We will look at how Parliament works in Britain, including how MPs are elected. Students will also look at how they can get their voice heard and have a say and explore the difference between violent and nonviolent protest. It will encourage them to think of how they can have a say in their local community by creating their own campaign.

#### YEAR 10: EXPERIENCE OF A WORKPLACE

In EL lessons, all students will be undertaking a virtual Work Experience program from REED Recruitment that will simulate a week of work experience within this company. Students will have the opportunity to 'visit' each department in the company whilst making resources targeted at the different roles before creating a presentation for the CEO. Year 10 will also be completing practice interviews on Friday 4th July with volunteers who are coming in to ask students some questions in a 'mock interview' setting. Year 10 also have their Experience of a Workplace placement to look forward to this term which links in with the current EL lessons.

**GCSE Statistics** 

Congratulations to our incredible Year 10 students who sat their GCSE Statistics papers over the past two weeks, marking a historic moment as the first-ever cohort at Deer Park Secondary School to undertake a GCSE examination! We are immensely proud of each and every one of you. Your diligent preparation and the calm, focused manner in which you entered the exam hall were truly commendable. #### **UKMT Junior Maths Challenge**

On the 1st May 23 students in Year 7 and Year 8 took part in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge. The Junior Maths Challenge is a national competition designed to encourage mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve engaging problems. It's a 60-minute, multiple-choice paper with 25 questions, crafted to make students think creatively and apply their mathematical knowledge in new and interesting ways. It's a fantastic experience that fosters a love for problem-solving and celebrates mathematical ingenuity.

The Hidden Dangers of scanning QR Codes Cyber criminals are increasingly exploiting QR technology to direct people to malicious websites designed to steal people's personal and financial information.

Although QR codes have become a convenient part of day to day life, they also carry some hidden risks. A recent investigation by Sky News revealed that organised crime groups are using QR code stickers placed across the UK, including near schools, to promote illegal online cannabis delivery services. Scanning these codes leads to websites offering next-day delivery, with transactions handled through banks and cryptocurrency. The products are often unregulated and potentially dangerous. https://news.sky.com/story/the-online-drug-trade-behind-qr-codestickers-plastered-on-streets-across-the-uk-13365660 Action Fraud has warned that criminals are also using fake QR codes to trick people into giving away personal and financial information. Some replace legitimate QR codes in places like car parks with fakes, while others send malicious codes via email in phishing attacks known as 'quishing'.

To stay safe, only scan QR codes from trusted sources, avoid using thirdparty scanning apps, and always double-check links before following them. Suspicious QR code activity should be reported to Action Fraud at <u>https://www.actionfraud.police.uk/a-z-of-fraud/qr-codes</u>

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# What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Occurring through messaging apps, on social media and in online games, group chats are among the most popular ways that young people engage with their peers online. Involving, by definition, three or more individuals, these groups allow users to send messages, images and videos to everyone in one place. While they are useful for helping friends, people with shared interests or members of a club to communicate and coordinate activities, they can also leave young people feeling excluded and bullied - as well as providing opportunities for inappropriate content to be shared and viewed.

### WHAT ARE E RISKS

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#### BULLYING

Unkind comments or images which are purposely aimed at an individual can be shared freely in a group chat – allowing and often encouraging others to join in the bullying behaviour. If this content is shared in a group of their peers (especially a larger group), it serves to amplify the hurt, embarrassment, anxiety and isolation that the victim feels.

#### EXCLUSION AND ISOLATION

This common issue with group chats ca happen in several ways: starting a new group, for instance, but deliberately exc uding e on an app wi

#### INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Some discussions in group chats may include inappropriate words, swearing and unsuitable images or videos. These could be viewed by your child if they are part of that group, whether they actively engage in it or not. Some chat apps have a disappearing message function, so your child may be unable to report something they've seen because it can only be viewed once or for a short time.

#### PRACTISE SAFE SHARING

In any online communication, it's vital for young people to be aware of what they're sharing and who might potentially see it. Discuss the importance of not revealing identifiable details like their address, their school or photos that they wouldn't like to be seen widely. Remind them that once something is shared in a group, they lose control of where it may end up and how it might be used.
