### YEAR 7: CURRENT CURRICULUM

### **Local Debates**

Our youngest geographers have been thinking like town planners and council members! They've been conducting a detailed study of a proposed local housing development, weighing up the pros and cons. This unit culminated in some brilliant debates and decision—making exercises where students had to justify whether the project should go ahead.

### YEAR 8: CURRENT CURRICULUM

### **Global Threats**

Year 8 have been scaling up their perspective, moving firmly into global issues. They began by investigating some of the major threats to our planet, including a deep dive into climate change. More recently, they have turned their attention to the powerful forces that shape our world, getting to grips with tectonic activity.

The UK's Changing Economy



Artical 42: Everyone Must Know Children's Rights.

So, whether you're a child or an adult, let's commit to learning about these rights and sharing them widely. Let's encourage open questions, share information, and create spaces where everyone feels empowered by this knowledge, knowing that these rights truly matter.

### **Numercy updates**

▶ Geometry at Home: Shaping Up Real-World Skills!

Moving on from our focus on measures last half term, let's pivot to a topic that underpins construction, art, technology, and nature: geometry.

Helping your child see the geometry in the world around them is one of the most engaging ways to show that maths is everywhere. Geometry isn't just about formulas; it's about spatial reasoning, problem-solving, and visualising the world. Below are some simple, practical ideas to help your child connect with geometric concepts at home.

### For Key Stage 3 (Years 7 & 8)

At this stage, the goal is to build confidence with shapes, their properties, and fundamental measurements like area and perimeter.

The Room Designer Challenge: Ask your child to measure a room (e.g., the kitchen or their bedroom). Challenge them to calculate its perimeter (for skirting boards) and area (for flooring or painting). This grounds the formulas for area and perimeter in a real-world context.

Symmetry Detective: Go on a "symmetry hunt." They should look for examples of line symmetry (in a butterfly, a logo, or a playing card) and rotational symmetry (in a fan, a wheel, or a star). Ask them to describe the order of rotational symmetry for various objects (e.g., a square has an order of 4).

★ Family Challenge: You have a rectangular garden that is 10m long and 4m wide. You want to build a circular patio with a radius of 2m. What area of the garden will not be covered by the patio? (Use π=3.14).

### For Key Stage 4 (Years 9, 10 & 11)

As students prepare for their GCSEs, they can apply their knowledge to more complex, multi-step problems involving 3D shapes, trigonometry, and scale.

Architectural Angles & Gradients: When looking at your house or local buildings, challenge them to spot right-angled triangles. Ask them to estimate the height of a tree or building using a simple clinometer or by applying basic trigonometry (SOH CAH TOA) based on their shadow and the shadow of the object. This is real-life application of finding the missing side of a triangle.

The Scale Model Project: If they are interested in building, gaming, or art, encourage them to find an object (like a piece of furniture) and draw it to scale (e.g., lcm on the paper represents 50cm in reality). This reinforces the concept of ratio and similarity in geometric figures.

★ Family Challenge: A triangular roof support has two sides that measure 5m and 8m, and the angle between them is 60°. What is the area of the triangle? (Hint: Use the formula Area=½ absinC).

We hope these ideas help you bring geometry to life at home. Every time your child notices a shape, angle, or scale, they are strengthening the spatial reasoning skills that are crucial for success in STEM subjects and countless real-world careers!

### **Literacy Update**

Literacy in Tutor Time: A Word a Week

This term, our focus has been on expanding vocabulary and developing a shared language across the school. Our Word of the Week initiative in tutor time is an easy way for students to learn new words and integrate them into their everyday language. Our most recent word was equal.

For something a little different, our Weird and Wonderful Word of the week was mubble-fubbles, which is an obscure English dialect word from the 16th century that means "to experience a fit of low mood or despondency – like the Sunday blues."

### The Big Questions

Over the past few weeks, students have also had the opportunity to explore some big questions and fascinating topics. These discussions are designed to broaden students' knowledge and critical thinking skills. We've delved into:

- Hot topics from around the world; What is the European Convention on Human Rights?
- Influential People; Dan Houser
- This week in history; The launch of Sputnik 2 and Laika
- Have you ever wondered; How the ISS was built?

These short explorations in tutor time help students build their cultural capital and become more engaged and informed citizens. We look forward to more exciting discussions in the coming weeks!


To ensure a smooth and safe drop-off and pick-up process, please utilise the designated drop-off points available on Sika Avenue.

## Hampshire Parent Information Workshops

SHATHA

The aim of each course is to provide insight, advice and support to family members of autistic children during the diagnostic pathway.

Funded by the Integrated Care Board, each session will explore a child's unique experiences, and suggest practical ways in which their differences can be accommodated and supported.

- Workshop spread across six sessions
- · Duration of sessions: Up to two or three hours
- Format: Presentation including opportunity for questions
- Face to face and online options available

### Who should attend?

Family members and others closely associated with the care and support of the child who lives in the Hampshire County Council area or whose child attends an Hampshire County Council school or doctors' surgery. Professionals may only attend in their capacity as parents or carers.

### Session details

### Session 1 - Introduction to autism

This session will provide some general context for the other sessions.

### Session 2 - Thinking

This session explores differences in brain structure and how this generates some unique styles of thinking. It includes some practical suggestions on how to support areas of difficulty,

### Session 3 - Communication

This session explores autistic perspectives on the use and processing of communication and strategies for adapting interactions in order to take these in into account.

### Session 4 - Social interaction

This session will focus on rethinking social expectations concerning your child and developing relationships in an autistic way.

### Session 5 - Sensory perception

During this session we will be looking at how sensory perception manifests itself in behaviour, and strategies to either alert or calm your child as appropriate.

### Session 6 - Behaviour

This session will explore how accepting, understanding and adapting to how your child sees the world can dramatically reduce anxiety and behaviours of concern.

### What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

## EASPORTS FC 26

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WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Our guide looks at the risks surrounding EA Sports FC 26 and our top tips to minimise them. This marks the third year since EA left the FIFA licence, and the game is mostly unchanged from last year. While Kick-Off mode is great for playing with friends and Career Mode allows players to fulfil long-term ambitions as a manager or player, Ultimate Team remains the main draw for many players – and it can get out of hand in terms of how much money players can invest.

### AN ANNUAL RELEASE SCHEDULE

As was the case with the last two EA Sports FC games and the FIFA series before it, the franchise rolls out once a year with updated squads and new features. This can make it expensive to keep up with, particularly when so many dedicated players are keen to get their hands on the latest edition.

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### VOICE CHAT

Voice chat can be enabled across all platforms, meaning young people can speak to anyone they play with or against. While it can be switched off, some children will no doubt want to speak to their friends while they play. This also means they may encounter strangers much older than them, which can expose them to inappropriate language or behaviours.

## IN-GAME PURCHASES THROUGH ULTIMATE TEAM

Ultimate Team is the big draw for EA
Sports FC, letting players spend real
money on packs that they can open to
build a squad of the world's best players.
They're not always easy to obtain, and new,
improved versions of players will be regularly
added as limited-time offerings. Young people
could feel pressured into spending money and
experience fear of missing out.

### SCAMMERS IN ULTIMATE TEAM

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Ultimate Team is managed by EA itself, but that hasn't stopped scammers from looking to dupe players out of money and in-game coins. Some scammers sell their accounts, which is a violation of EA's terms of service, while others will 'sell' coins - something the developer is still working to crack down on. Some try to gain access to others' accounts, potentially giving them access to payment information.

## POTENTIAL FOR

While EA Sports FC is potentially addictive, thanks to its fast-paced gameplay and mirroring of the real-world skill and glamour of football, Ultimate Team's focus on limited-time rewards and the lottery of winning packs can make it feel closer to gambling than gaming, which may lead to addiction and impulsive spending of money.

## Advice for Parents & Educators

### PREPARE FOR ANOTHER GAME IN A YEAR

The annual-release cadence aligns with the return of the school year, and can be a great way to incentivise good behaviour at the start of term. If children are applying themselves and preparing for a new year of school, or were particularly well behaved in the summer, EA Sports FC 26 could make a great reward.

### LIMIT SPENDING

If you're worried about children accidentally spending real money in Ultimate Team, whether in game or on the EA Sports FC companion app, don't link a payment card to their account. Reclaiming funds can be a mountain to climb, and the dopamine hit of opening flashy packs with slick animations means one purchase can lead to another very quickly. It's also worth adding a prepaid card if you'd prefer them to make their own choices with their budget.

### MONITOR VOICE CHAT

As in-game chat is open, be sure to adjust the settings in EA Sports FC 26 to lock it down. If children want to chat with their friends while they play, consider setting up a safe space for them to call, to allow them to play without fear of outsiders.

### **BE VIGILANT**


As with last year, there are ways to keep scammers at bay. Ensure passwords are locked down, and consider using a password manager application to keep them secure. EA will never contact players through the game itself, so be vigilant with incoming messages, and block and report suspected spam. EA will contact players by email if needed, but they will never ask for usernames or passwords. Players should also avoid buying in-game currency from unofficial websites - doing so can lead to except the page and could gest players makes in the process.
