


Colleges offer vocational courses which means you attend College with other students and study towards a qualification.









'A' Levels

Advanced level qualifications (known as A levels) are subject-based qualifications that can lead to university, further study, training, or work. You can normally study three or more A levels over two years.

You normally need to have at least five GCSEs at grades 9 to 4/A* to C to progress on to A Levels.







'A' Levels

The most important criteria for choosing A levels subjects are:

- Looking at what you are likely to enjoy and be good at. If you enjoy a subject or have an ability in it already, you are more likely to do well.
- Are there any particular subjects and/or grades you may need? If you have a particular career, job, or further study in mind, you may need to choose specific A levels in order to meet entry requirements.

What is an Apprenticeship?



An apprenticeship is a paid job where you will learn and gain valuable experience from your employer and your colleagues whilst studying towards a recognised qualification;

Alongside on-the-job training, an apprentice will spend at least 20% of their working hours completing off the job training which may include attending College or University, job shadowing colleagues or completing online training to upskill their knowledge








Apprenticeships – What is the equivalent?

Entry Requirements

As apprenticeships are real employment, entry requirements will vary between employers depending on their requirements and needs. If necessary, apprenticeship training providers can help prepare individuals to reach the standard required by the employer before they go for interview.









Money - What Will You Get Paid?

Age & Apprenticeship Stage	Apprenticeship Wage (per hour)
Aged under 18	£4.81
Aged over 18 (but still on the first year of your apprenticeship)	£4.81
Aged 18-20	£6.83

So, a 16 year old will work around 35 hours per week x £4.81 per hour = £168.35 per week minimum which is a minimum of £8, 754.20 per year.

EARN WHILE YOU LEARN!







A company can pay an apprentice whatever they like as long as it is above the minimum of £4.81 per hour:

Travel Consultant Apprenticeship - Hedge End - HAYS TRAVEL LIMITED - Annual wage - £10,404.00

Front Office Apprentice - HILTON UK HOTELS LIMITED - Annual wage £20,280.00

Business and Medical Receptionist Apprentice - STOKE WOOD SURGERY - Annual wage £14,000.00

Horticulture apprentice and Landscaping Apprentice - HAVEN GARDENS LIMITED - **Annual wage** £14,560.00

The Royal Navy - Physical Training Specialisation Direct Entry - Personal Trainer Apprenticeship - Royal Navy - Start on a salary of over £20,400 rising to £33,000 on completion of your role specific training.

T-Levels

What is a T-Level?

- ☐ T Levels are new courses which can follow GCSEs.
- Each T-Level is equivalent to 3 A levels.
- ☐ T-Levels are studied over 2 years;
- ☐ They were launched in September 2020 and developed in collaboration with employers and education providers.







- The content of T-Levels has been created so that it meets the needs of industries and it also prepares students for work, further training or further study;
- Students study in a classroom environment but also gain valuable on-the-job experience through an industry placement of at least 315 hours, which equates to approximately 45 days;
- You do not receive any pay when completing a T-Level, however, your placement may pay for travel expenses at their discretion.


